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PREPERATION

I first learned about the BIP opportunity through my university's dashboard. After reviewing the programms details and eligibility requirements, I submitted my application along with a motivation letter. Initially, I was accepted into the BIP program in Malta. However, due to a limited number of participants allowed from the host university, I was advised to choose an alternative program. I then applied for the BIP in Târgu Mureş, Romania, and was accepted.

The communication with both the host and home universities was clear, timely, and well-coordinated. I received comprehensive information regarding the program schedule, travel arrangements, accommodation, and academic expectations. Once I received official confirmation of my participation, I proceeded to book my travel.

Tina Kaffl provided a valuable support with the Erasmus+ documentation and offered guidance throughout the preparation process. The host university also ensured we were well-informed by providing detailed instructions regarding arrival and transportation logistics.



ACCOMMODATION

We stayed in the host university's accommodation, which was one of the highlights of the trip. The facilities were clean, modern, and very comfortable. The cost was also reasonable, at €150.

The accommodation was located within walking distance of the host university, we used to walk around 30 mins to the host university. Additionally, the university arranged transportation for us from the airport to the accommodation upon arrival, and again for our departure. This thoughtful support contributed greatly to a smooth and stress-free experience.

COURSES AT THE HOST UNIVERSITY

The BIP program at the UMFST university in Târgu Mureș was well-organized and provided a valuable academic experience. The course content focused on Circular Economy "Business Model Canvas for Circular Economy", and included both theoretical sessions and practical activities that encouraged group collaboration and intercultural exchange. We used the Canvas Business Model in the practical aspect of the prgram. The topics were relevant, engaging, and applicable to real-world scenarios, making the learning process both useful and interesting.

The university offered facilities to support the program, including classrooms, reliable Wi-Fi, and access to learning resources via Microsoft Team.

Although the program was intensive, there were also opportunities to engage in leisure and social activities. The university organized a wine industry visit, music concert, and a farewell party.
